

> During this term, our focus across school in our E-safety lessons has been 'Online Relationships' and 'Online Reputation'. Each class has had lessons around these themes and have been

able to build on their knowledge of them. We also participated in Safer Internet Day in February. The theme this year was 'All fun and games? Exploring respect and relationships online'. Additionally, we were lucky enough to have 'One Day Creative' come into school to run workshops for each class across Key Stage 1 and 2.
