- Bedtime is the perfect time to read together. It helps create a routine and can make going to bed something your child looks forward to. It is a special time for a parent and child to share.





## Check out some top reads for October.

Meet Toto: she's no ordinary cat, and she can't wait to have an adventure with you! Toto the cat and her brother Silver live footloose and fancy-free in a townhouse in London. Toto is almost totally blind, and learned to trust her senses from a ninja cat-master who taught her back in Italy where they were born.

By day, Toto and Silver seem to be ordinary cats, but by night, they love to have adventures! One evening, news reaches Toto that a king cobra has escaped from London Zoo! Together with help from a very posh cat and two hungry tigers, Toto and Silver must investigate. Can they find the giant snake, before it's too late?

Joe wants to play sharks and crocodiles, but all the other children want to do is talk about why he only has one leg. Hilarious questions ensue – "was it a burglar?", "did it fall off...in the toilet...?". Eventually the power of play wins out, and they all end up playing sharks and pirates together. The missing leg seems irrelevant. This superb picture book can help open up an honest exploration of the experience of physical disability, and what it might feel like to be seen as different.





A twisty and heart-pounding mystery at sea, from award-winning A.M. Howell. July, 1936. As the Queen Mary sets sail across the Atlantic, Alice can't wait for the summer of adventure that lies ahead. She's excited to explore the huge ship, with its shops, animals and even celebrities on board.
